# 2018-5 WORK ORDER (Effective April 2, 2018)

Under 28 U.S.C. § 154, the bankruptcy judges are assigned these matters. This order recognizes the announced retirement of Judge Karen K. Brown effective April 1, 2018 and the appointment of Judge Jeffrey P. Norman effective April 2, 2018. Except as set forth below, each judge will retain all cases currently on such judge's docket. All new case assignments shall be made randomly by the clerk in accordance with the percentage allocations shown in this order for each division.

The assignment of complex chapter 11 cases is governed by General Order 2018-1.

## 1. Brownsville Division.

# 8. Adversary Proceedings.

- A. Unless otherwise specified above, adversary proceedings that are related to a main case will be assigned to the Bankruptcy Judge to whom the main case is assigned.
- B. All adversary proceedings that are not related to a main case will be randomly assigned amongst the Bankruptcy Judges in the same proportions as set forth in the relevant division for the assignment of chapter 7 bankruptcy cases.

## 9. Recusals.

- A. If a judge assigned a complex chapter 11 cases recuses, the case will be reassigned to the other judge to whom complex cases are assigned.
- B. In all other recusals, the case will be reassigned in accordance with this table:

C. If a judge that receives a case under this paragraph is also required to recuse, the assignment will be made by the chief judge after consultation with the judges that are not recused.

## 10. Transfers of Cases within the District.

A judge may transfer a case, an adversary proceeding, or a contested matter to any other judge within the District.

## 11. Miscellaneous Emergency Matters.

Applications for temporary restraining orders, preliminary injunctions or other emergency matter will be considered by the judge to whom the case is assigned. If the judge to whom the case is assigned is not available and the matter requires emergency attention, the matter may be considered by any other judge within the District.

# 12. Authority.

This order does not deprive a bankruptcy judge of jurisdiction or authority over any case, proceeding or matter. A bankruptcy judge may try cases and handle other matters for another bankruptcy judge by agreement of the respective judges.
